People are drawn to the region's living culture – and its Celtic, Acadian and Mi'kmaq history and traditions. International festivals, museums, national historic sites, and major cultural events contribute to the richness of life on the Island. The beauty of Cape Breton is displayed in every season, with warm summers, spectacular autumns, crisp winters and pleasant springs.

Cape Breton has a diverse cultural background with a unique ancestry of over 30 cultures including Acadian, Scottish, Mi'kmaq, African, Irish and more.

The island is home to an extensive network of national heritage sites, museums and experiential-based tourism assets, as well as one of Canada's most economically successful First Nation communities, Membertou, and the world's largest Mi'kmaq community, Eskasoni.

With a proud Scottish heritage, many institutions on the Island such as The Gaelic College/Colaisde na Gàidhlig, located in St. Ann's, have been developed to celebrate, honour and teach cultural expressions including the performing arts, language and production of traditional crafts and tools.

MARCONI NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

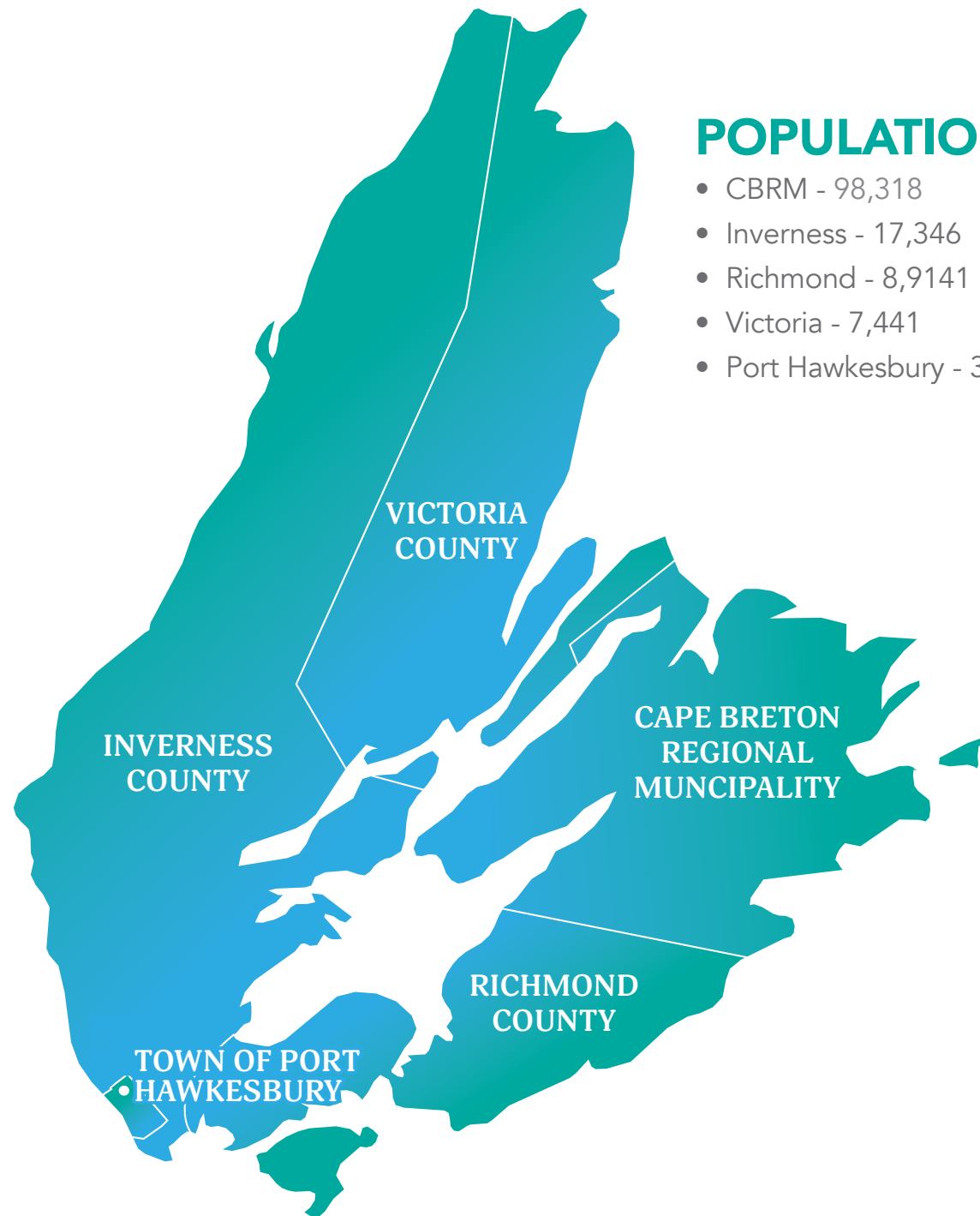

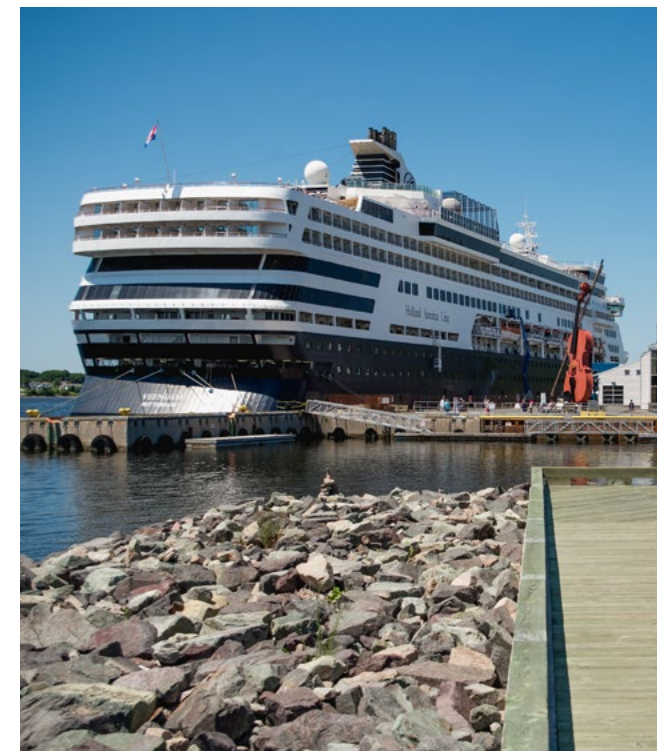

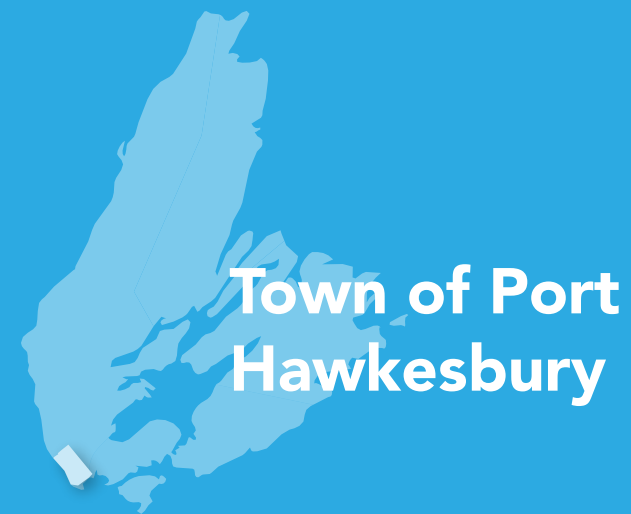

Cape Breton Regional Municipality (CBRM)



The Cape Breton Regional Municipality (CBRM) was created in 1995 through the amalgamation of eight municipalities in Cape Breton County. As a result, CBRM accounts for 74% of Cape Breton's population. CBRM is home to Sydney, the second largest urban area in the province and the largest in Cape Breton. There are also two First Nation Communities within the CBRM—Membertou and Eskasoni.

The CBRM is home to some of Cape Breton's largest institutions, including Cape Breton University, the Nova Scotia Community College Marconi Campus, and the Canadian Coast Guard College. Rural areas of CBRM host resource industries such as agriculture, fishing, and industrial production. In the CBRM, you will find downtowns in the midst of transformation, infrastructure that offers businesses a competitive edge and a warm welcoming community ready to embrace you and your family. Connected to the world by road, water and air, the CBRM offers easy access to national and international markets. The J.A. Douglas McCurdy Airport is located just a 15 minute drive away from downtown Sydney and is equipped with two Instrument Landing System (ILS) runways allowing the airport to handle most commercial jet traffic.



Town of Port Hawkesbury

The Town of Port Hawkesbury is located on the west coast of Cape Breton Island, bordered by the Strait of Canso as well as both Richmond and Inverness Counties. The town offers a unique blend of economic, cultural, and lifestyle opportunities and hosts many businesses and services that serve all communities of the Strait Area both on Cape Breton Island and mainland Nova Scotia.

The Town is home to one of the Island's two NSCC Campuses and includes the Nautical Institute, a Transport Canada approved marine training program for students who want to start or advance their career at sea. The Strait Area has substantial development potential with growth opportunities in manufacturing, technology, transportation/distribution, energy, and the oceans industries.

Port Hawkesbury is connected to the world via road, rail, water, and air. Located in nearby Port Hastings, the Allan J. MacEachen Port Hawkesbury Airport is a full service fixed-base operator and offers concierge and aircraft services, as well as helicopter tours, through Celtic Air Services.

Richmond County

Located on the Cape Breton side of the Strait of Canso, adjacent to international shipping lanes, the Municipality of the County of Richmond is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean on the south and by the Bras d'Or Lakes on the north.

Shaped by the sea and proud of its past, Richmond County blends traditional industry with a laid-back lifestyle. Deeply rooted in the fishing and shipbuilding industries, this land of 1,000 coves is home to a rich fishing ground, producing some of the world's best lobsters and exquisite mussels, scallops, and oysters.

Approximately one-third of Richmond's residents speak both French and English, since the county is home to several vibrant Acadian communities. The county is also home to thriving Gaelic and Mi'kmaq cultures, including Potlotek First Nation, contributing to the area's rich history - a history which is celebrated during numerous festivals and events held around the county throughout the year.



Inverness County

The Municipality of the County of Inverness comprises most of the western coastline of Cape Breton Island and reaches inland as far as the beautiful Bras d'Or Lakes.

A mix of unspoiled beauty and warm welcoming communities, Inverness County is home to several thriving and vibrant cultures, including Acadian, Scottish, and home to a Mi'kmaq community, We'koqma'q First Nation. Many residents of the county identify as bilingual, thanks to local francophone and Mi'kmaq-led educational centres, as well as a satellite location for the Gaelic College (Colaisde na Gàidhlig), North America's only year-round Gaelic-language educational non-profit institution.

The county boasts a number of popular recreational and tourism attractions, including several maintained beaches, the Inverness County Centre for the Arts, the Celtic Shores Coastal Multi-Use Trails, the Cabot Trail, the Cape Breton Highlands National Park, and a number of golf courses, including world-class Cabot Links and Cabot Cliffs Golf Courses.

The Municipality of the County of Victoria is located in the heart of Cape Breton. Victoria County

Breathtaking vistas and tight-knit communities make Victoria County a welcoming place and like other areas of Cape Breton, there is a rich mix of cultures including Scottish, Irish, and Mi'kmaq, such as Wagmatcook First Nation. Contributing to Victoria County's vibrant cultural landscape is the Gaelic College (Colaisde na Gàidhlig), North America's only year-round Gaelic language educational non-profit institution.

With the highest number of businesses per capita in the province, Victoria County is poised as the entrepreneurship capital of Nova Scotia. Fisheries and tourism are the key economic drivers of this area, fueled by an energetic group of entrepreneurs. Victoria County is home to a number of long-standing tourism operators and attractions, including the world famous Cabot Trail, the Cape Breton Highlands National Park, the Keltic Lodge at the Highlands, and world-class Highlands Links and Bell Bay Golf Courses.

5 Mi'kmaw First Nation Communities

Cape Breton Island is home to five Mi'kmaw First Nation communities: Eskasoni, We'koqma'q, Wagmatcook, Membertou, and Potlotek. Membertou is recognized as a leader in economic development across the world and Eskasoni is the largest Mi'kmaq community in the world. All five communities have a tremendous impact on Cape Breton Island.

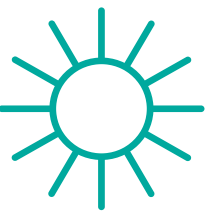

Education

The Cape Breton-Victoria Regional Centre for Education is comprised of more than 56 elementary, junior high and high schools, as well as 185 adult education centres.

The Conseil Scolaire Acadien Provincial is the francophone school board in Nova Scotia. There are three francophone schools in Cape Breton: Centre Scolaire Etoile de L'Acadie in Sydney, Ecole NDA in Arichat and Ecole Beau-Port in Cheticamp.

In addition to the schools that are included in the provincial network, each of the five First Nation communities have their own schools and Boards.

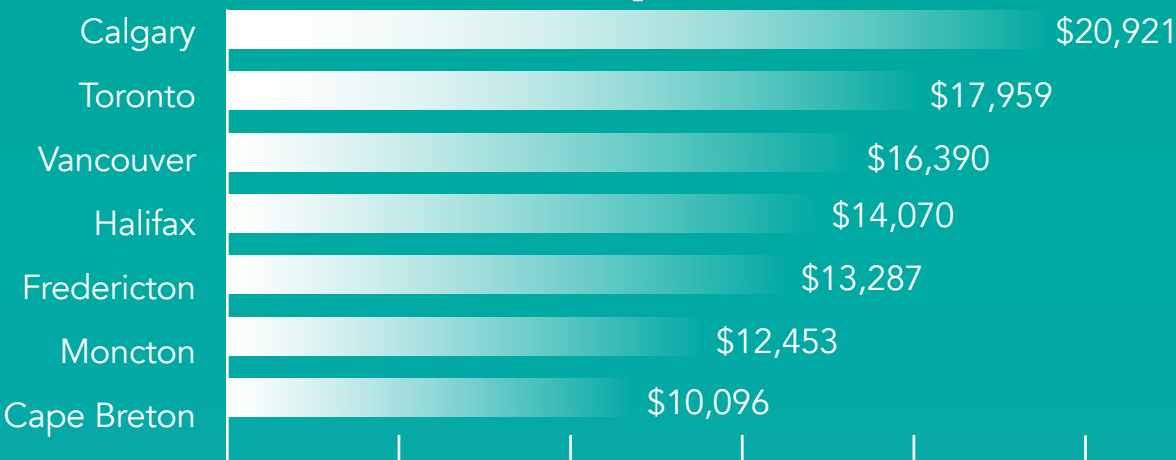

GETTING HERE IS AS EASY AS 1, 2, 3.

By air: there are direct flights into Sydney from Toronto, Halifax and Montreal. By car: the Trans-Canada Highway 104 leads to Cape Breton Island. By water: there are two ferries from Newfoundland, cruiselines dock at various ports on the island, or boaters may chart their own course. If you fly into Sydney, car rentals are plentiful. You can also hire a taxi, take a shuttle or a bus tour.

Cape Breton has a full-service airport—the JA Douglas McCurdy Sydney Airport—with direct flights from Toronto and Montreal and numerous connections via the Halifax Stanfield International Airport. In addition, Celtic Air Services, a full service Fixed-Based Operator at the Alan J MacEachen Airport, provides another fly-in option when visiting Cape Breton by air. **Bonus:** Nova Scotia is located two hours closer to Europe than any other North American destination, and Halifax is closer to Boston and New York than any other Canadian city via air.

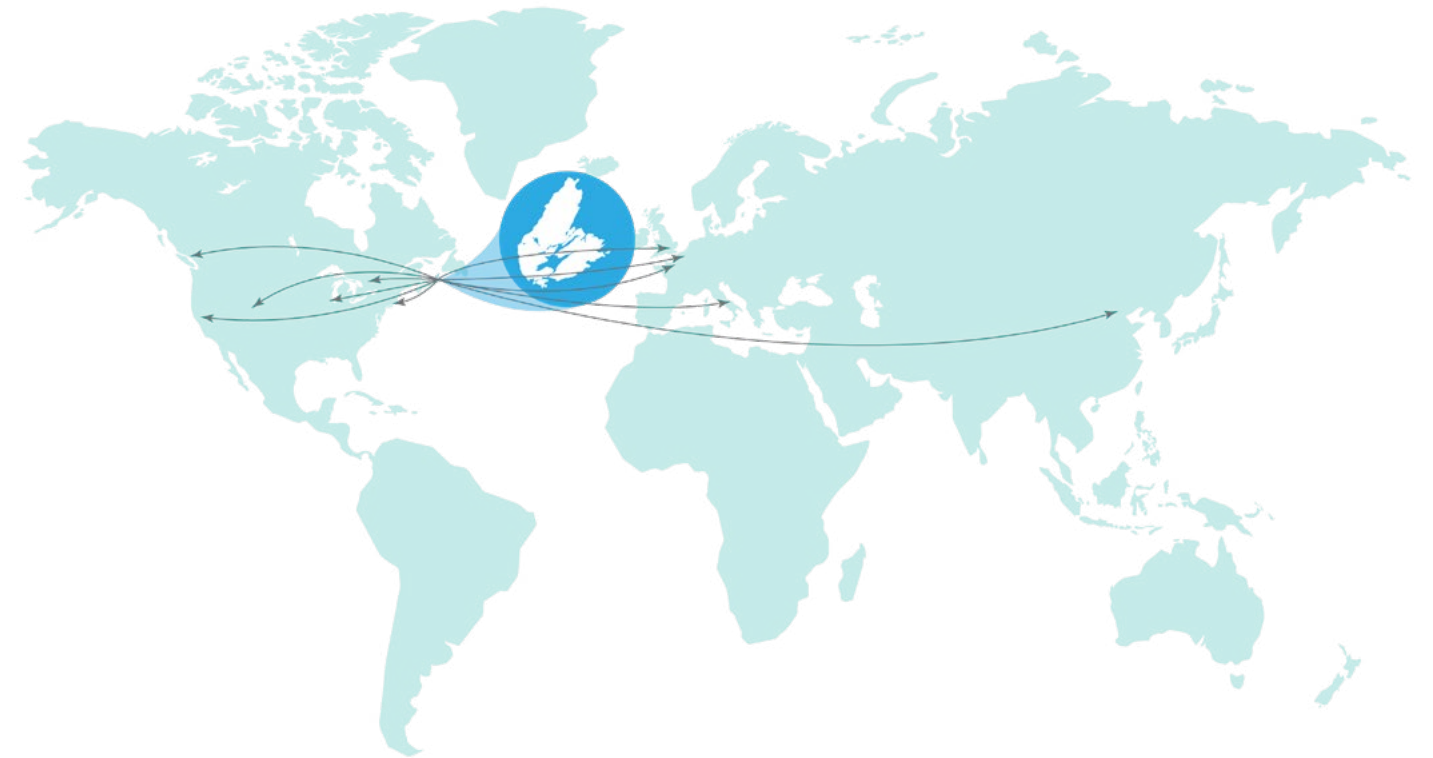

Business Costs

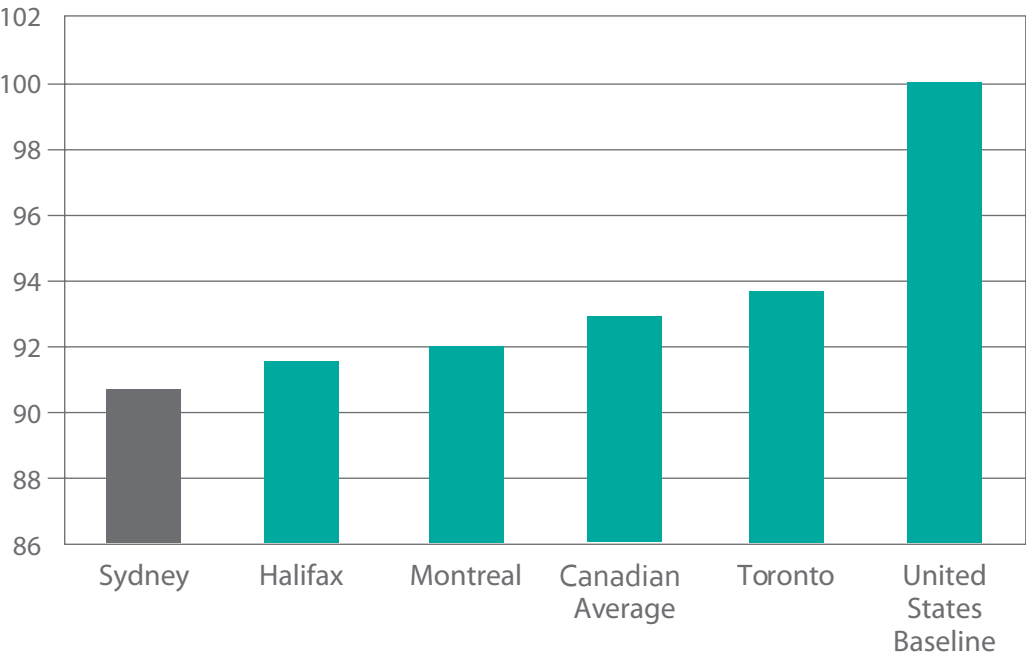
Cape Breton Island offers companies one of the lowest business-cost locations within the G8 countries.

Whether you are a manufacturer of products selling into US or European markets, Cape Breton is one of the best locations in North America from a business-cost perspective. This cost advantage was confirmed by the KPMG Competitive Alternatives 2014 – Special Report which looked at the costs for

17 different industries across over 100 jurisdictions in North America, Europe, Asia and Australia.

According to the report, Canada is the cost-leader with business-costs five percent below the US. Sydney, Cape Breton was found to be one of most cost-competitive regions of Canada when compared to other major centres. The table below displays Sydney's index ranking compared to Canada's major centres.

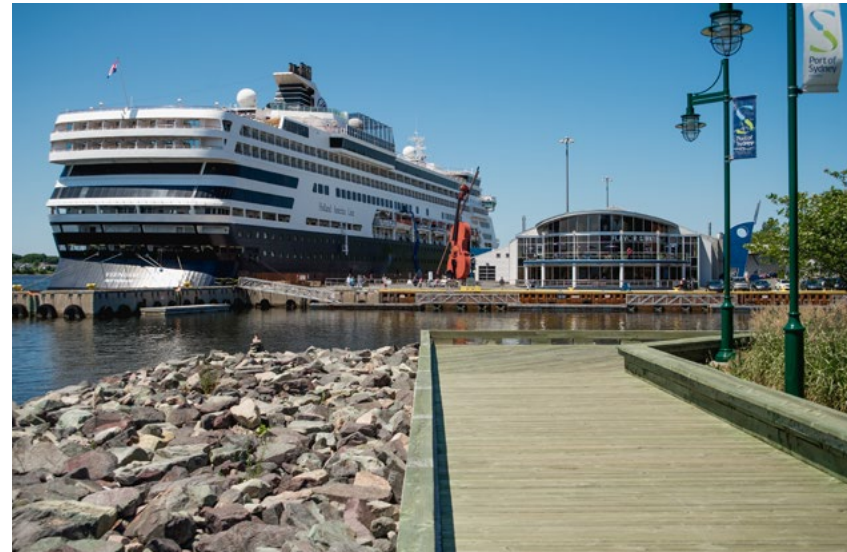

SEA

PORT OF SYDNEY - Located on the northeastern shore of Cape Breton Island, and featuring a 17m (56 ft) draft, the Sydney Port offers a full range of services. Federal, provincial and municipal governments, along with the private sector, have invested \$38 million to dredge the harbour to deepen the access channel allowing post-panamax ships access into the Port of Sydney.

The cruise ship industry has become a key part of Cape Breton's tourism sector with over 100 ships per year docking in the Port of Sydney while smaller cruise ships regularly access the ports of Louisbourg and Baddeck.

STRAIT OF CANSO – Located between mainland Nova Scotia and Cape Breton Island, the Strait of Canso is the deepest harbour on the North American East Coast. It is 20 km long (12.42 mi), up to 1.5 km wide (.93 mi) with a depth of 27 m (89 ft) that can handle vessels up to 500,000 dwt. It has two public harbours, Port Hawkesbury and Mulgrave, and five private terminals.



AIR

THE J.A. DOUGLAS MCCURDY SYDNEY AIRPORT provides multiple flights per day to the Halifax Stanfield International Airport, Toronto Pearson International Airport and seasonal direct flights to Montréal-Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport. Air Canada and WestJet also offer direct flights from Sydney to Toronto. The airport's main runway is 7,070 ft (2,155 m).

THE ALLAN J. MACEACHEN AIRPORT provides corporate and charter aircraft services. Located approximately 8 kms (4.9 mi) from the Port Hawkesbury town limits, the paved runway is 1,524 m (5,000 ft) long by 46 m (150 ft) wide, with radio-controlled lighting for night operations.

ROAD

There are three 100-series highways in Cape Breton (Highway 104, Highway 105 Trans Canada Highway, and Highway 125) totalling 211 km (131 mi) of roadway. Visitors can access Cape Breton via the Canso Causeway on mainland Nova Scotia. A full range of services from large fleet operations to small niche trucking companies are available for the shipment of cargo. Cape Breton is also the transshipment point for all truck cargo to and from Newfoundland and Labrador.

FERRY

MARINE ATLANTIC FERRY provides the vital service linking automobile and cargo traffic from Newfoundland and Labrador via North Sydney to the rest of Canada.

Telecommunications Infrastructure

Cape Breton is connected to the world with telecommunications infrastructures and internet networks from Bell Aliant, Rogers Internet Communications, Eastlink, Seaside Communications, Starlink and MTS/Allstream. These networks hub through Cape Breton and the main fibre optic networks connect through Sydney and on to Newfoundland and Labrador. Seaside Communications & Eastlink also provide state of the art wireless broadband to rural areas.

Energy Infrastructure

Cape Breton is the energy hub for Nova Scotia, producing more than 80% of Nova Scotia's electricity at coal generating power plants, a variety of wind farms and a hydro-electric facility at Wreck Cove.

The Island also provides unique opportunities for global companies to take advantage of the many renewable and/or alternative energy sources available. Companies may want to develop other opportunities to meet their energy needs, which could include exploring:

- their ability to leverage the new hydro-electric energy corridor;
- the vast tracks of land available for biomass growth and bioenergy production;
- the Island's favourable wind regime;
- the fast-flowing waters for tidal energy;
- the potential for geothermal or coal bed methane energy from the Island's immense coal mining sites; and
- the oil and natural gas resources available in the region.

Immigration 101

Immigration information presented in this booklet is subject to change by both provincial and federal governments; please refer to the **Department of Labour, Skills and Immigration** and **Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada** for the most up to date information, procedures and applications.



THERE ARE TWO MAIN PATHS TO START YOUR JOURNEY TOWARDS IMMIGRATION:

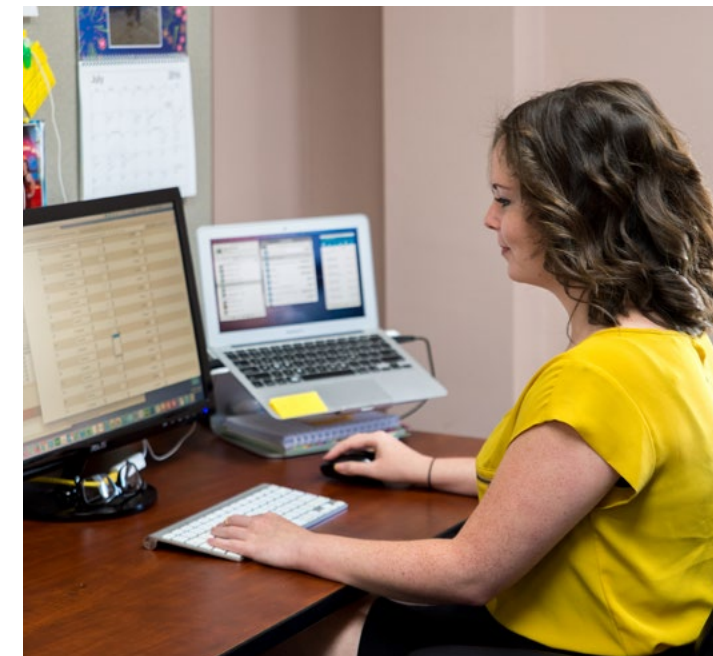
1. Acquiring a Work Permit or a Post Graduate Work Permit (if you graduate from a recognized publicly-funded educational institution in Canada).
2. Acquiring permanent residency gives you the same rights and obligations as a Canadian citizen, however:
 - You may not vote in elections;
 - You may not run for public office;
 - You will need to have lived in Canada a minimum of 2 years in every 5-year period to maintain the PR status; and
 - In the case of a serious offence, you may be deported and have your permanent residency status revoked.

Immigration in Canada is a shared responsibility between both the federal and provincial governments. There are a number of immigration pathways for you to consider.

After 3 years of Canadian residency (with permanent residency status) you may apply for Citizenship. Canada allows dual citizenship, as such, you will not be required to give up your current nationality to obtain Canadian Citizenship.

The National Occupation Classification System

The National Occupation Classification (NOC) System is the classification system used to identify the skill level and educational requirements needed to perform a certain job. The NOC system is used for various purposes, one of which is immigration - as it sets the standards for the Canadian Labour Market.



NOC Groups

- 1. NOC 0:**
(also considered Skill Level A): Top-level management positions.
- 2. NOC A:**
Occupations that usually require university level education.
- 3. NOC B:**
Occupations that usually require college education or apprenticeship training.
- 4. NOC C:**
Occupations that usually require secondary school and or Occupation Specific Training.
- 5. NOC D:**
Occupations that only require on the job training.

Immigration Categories

IMMIGRATION TO CANADA CAN BE EASILY CLASSIFIED UNDER FOUR CLASSES:

- 1. Economic Class
- 2. Family Class
- 3. Protected Persons Class
- 4. Other (Humanitarian & Compassionate)

THERE ARE 8 MAIN CATEGORIES OF CANADIAN IMMIGRATION THAT FALL UNDER THESE 4 CLASSES:

- 1. Express Entry
- 2. Provincial nominees
- 3. Atlantic Immigration Program
- 4. Start-Up Visa
- 5. Rural and Northern Immigration Pilot
- 6. Family Sponsorship
- 7. Quebec-selected Skilled Workers
- 8. Self-employed

ADDITIONAL ALTERNATIVE CATEGORIES INCLUDE:

- 1. The Caregivers Program
- 2. Refugees & Asylum Program

Each stream has different criteria, so interested individuals should review the requirements for each stream carefully.

HOW PROGRAM & STREAM CRITERIA WORK:

- You may qualify for the Provincial Nominee Program or Skilled Worker if you have a post-secondary education and/or at least one year of skilled work experience outside Canada (NOC 0, A or B). Some streams under the Provincial Nominee Program do not require post-secondary education.
- You may qualify for the Provincial Nominee Program or the Atlantic Immigration Program (in Atlantic Canada) if you have a valid Canadian job offer that meets certain conditions, depending on the immigration program.
- You may qualify under the Family Class Program if you have close relatives in Canada.
- You may qualify under the Canadian Experience Class or Quebec Experience Class if you have already studied and/or worked in Canada.
- You may qualify under the Business Investor/Entrepreneur immigration programs or the Provincial Nominee Program if you have a high net worth or significant financial resources.

The economic class generally refers to a direct economic contribution by the person immigrating to Canada, with the following as the most common pathways:

- Provincial Nominee Program
- The Atlantic Immigration Program
- High Skilled Economic (Skilled Trades & Workers, Canadian Experience)
- Business Immigrants (Start-up Visa & Caregivers)



The Atlantic Immigration Program (AIP)

The Atlantic Immigration Program is a collaborative partnership between the Government of Canada and the four Atlantic Provinces; Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland and Labrador, to augment the number of immigrants being accepted through existing federal and provincial programs in the Atlantic region.

Originally launched as the Atlantic Immigration Pilot Program (AIP) in 2017, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada launched the permanent Atlantic Immigration Program in January 2021 due to its success in the previous five years.

Unlike other immigration pathways, the program is employer driven. An employer must become designated by the Department of Labour, Skills and Immigration to participate in the Program in Nova Scotia.

Under the Atlantic Immigration Program, applicants may be eligible if they meet certain requirements for work experience, education, language and a full-time, non-seasonal job offer in an eligible position.

The job offer must be in NOC 0, A, B, or C.

Applicants with a valid post-secondary educational credential issued by an institution in an Atlantic province may be exempt from the work experience requirement.



The number one reason for us to be here in Cape Breton is quality of life. We've lived all over Canada, in big cities and small, and even spent 15 years abroad, but nothing ever compared to what we found here in Cape Breton. We actually traveled to the Island on our honeymoon, and were hooked immediately, so we bought a farm in Nyanza nine years ago, sight-unseen. We knew there was work to be done, but no paradise can come without its hard work and compromise. My husband had been making plans to start a brewery for some time and fate even provided a water source nearby with the perfect conditions for what we wanted to do. Provincial Economic Class

THE PROVINCIAL NOMINEE PROGRAM

The Provincial Nominee Program allows the province to select individuals to nominate to the federal government who will contribute to the Nova Scotia labour market and economy.

THERE ARE 9 STREAMS UNDER THE NOVA SCOTIA PROVINCIAL NOMINEE PROGRAM.

SKILLED WORKER: (NOC 0, A, B)

(Also includes NOC C and NOC D).

To apply you must:

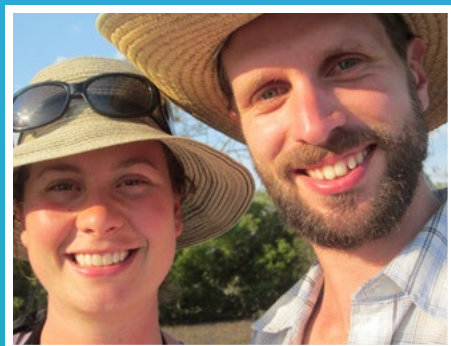
- Have a full-time permanent job offer from a Nova Scotia employer;
- Have 1 year of work experience related to the job. (Semi-skilled and low-skilled workers must already have six months' experience with the employer.);
- Be 21 to 55 years old;
- Have a high school diploma;
- Have the appropriate training, skills and/or accreditation for the job;
- Prove language ability equal to Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) Level 5 if you are a skilled worker. If your first language is English or French, that is enough proof. Semi-skilled and low-skilled workers must have test results to prove they meet CLB 4 even if their first language is English or French;
- Show enough financial resources to successfully settle in Nova Scotia

INTERNATIONAL GRADUATES IN DEMAND

The International Graduates in Demand stream is for recent international graduates whose skills and education match specific National Occupational Classification (NOC) job categories. This stream is currently open to workers in 2 NOC job categories:

NOC 3413: nurse aides, orderlies, and patient service associates
NOC 4214: early childhood educators and assistants

ELIGIBILITY

To apply you must:

- have a full-time permanent job offer from a Nova Scotia employer in a job category listed above that corresponds with your recent field of study;
- be 21 to 55 years old;
- have a high school diploma;
- have met requirements for completing a course of study within three years of your application. The program must have been at least 30 weeks in length. You must have completed at least 50% of the program in Nova Scotia.
- If you are applying under NOC 3413, your program must grant a certificate, diploma, or degree.
- If you are applying under NOC 4214, your program must grant a diploma or a degree.
- have certifications issued by NS regulatory bodies required for the job;
- prove language ability equal to Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) Level 5 even if your first language is English or French;
- show enough financial resources to successfully settle in Nova Scotia.

NOVA SCOTIA EXPERIENCE: EXPRESS ENTRY STREAM

The Nova Scotia Experience: Express Entry stream selects highly skilled individuals who wish to live in Nova Scotia permanently. Applicants must have at least one year of experience working in Nova Scotia in a high skilled occupation (NOC 0, A, or B).

ELIGIBILITY

To apply you must:

- Have at least 1 year of work experience in Nova Scotia;
- be 21 to 55 years old;
- have a Canadian high school credential or equivalent;
- prove language ability in English or French on the Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB). You need CLB 7 for skilled work in the National Occupational Classification (NOC) 0 and A. You need CLB 5 for NOC B positions;
- Have a profile registered in Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada’s Express Entry system.

NOVA SCOTIA LABOUR MARKET PRIORITIES STREAM

The Nova Scotia Labour Market Priorities Stream selects candidates in the federal Express Entry system who meet provincial labour market needs to apply for nomination. Only candidates who receive a Letter of Interest from the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration may apply.

ELIGIBILITY

To apply you must:

- Receive a Letter of Interest from the Nova Scotia Nominee Program within the Express Entry system;
- Submit your application within 30 calendar days of the date on which your letter of interest was issued;
- Meet the minimum work experience requirements of the Express Entry stream for which you have qualified;
- Demonstrate sufficient funds to successfully establish yourself and your family in Nova Scotia and to pay your immigration costs and travel expenses;
- Have legal status in your current country of residence; and
- Meet eligibility criteria in place at the time you are issued a Letter of Interest.

HOW TO APPLY

If you have received a Letter of Interest, complete the online application form and include all required information and attachments.



OCCUPATIONS IN DEMAND STREAM

The Occupations in Demand Stream targets specific NOC C, intermediate-skilled occupations that are in high labour market demand in Nova Scotia. The Office of Immigration identifies occupations in demand based on labour market information and eligible occupations are subject to change.

ELIGIBILITY

To apply you must:

- Have a full-time permanent job offer from a Nova Scotia employer;
- Have 1 year of work experience related to the job;
- Be 21 to 55 years old;
- Have a high school diploma;
- Have the appropriate training, skills and/or accreditation for the job;
- Prove language ability equal to Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) Level 4 even if your first language is English or French;
- Show enough financial resources to successfully settle in Nova Scotia.

HOW TO APPLY

Complete the online application form and include all required information and attachments.



ENTREPRENEUR STREAM

The Entrepreneur Stream is for experienced business owners or senior business managers who want to live in Nova Scotia. They must start a new business or buy an existing business and must actively participate in the day-to-day management of the business. After operating the business for a year, the entrepreneur may be nominated for permanent resident status. Interested individuals are encouraged to read the guide on the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration's website and submit an Expression of Interest (EOI).

ELIGIBILITY – CANDIDATES MUST:

- Be 21 years of age or older
- Want to live permanently in Nova Scotia while owning and actively managing a Nova Scotia business
- Have a net worth of at least \$600,000 CAD
- Be able to invest at least \$150,000 CAD of your own money to establish a business in Nova Scotia
- Have at least 3 years' experience actively managing and owning a business (1/3 ownership minimum) OR more than 5 years' experience in a senior business management role
- Have a score of at least 5 on the Canadian Language Benchmark in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English or French
- Complete an online Expression of Interest
- Receive an Invitation to apply from the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration



PHYSICIAN STREAM

The Physician Stream assists Nova Scotia's public health authorities – the Nova Scotia Health Authority (NSHA) and the Izaak Walton Killam Health Centre (IWK) – to hire general practitioners, family physicians, and specialist physicians to work in Nova Scotia. The stream helps the NSHA and IWK to recruit and retain physicians with the required skills for positions that they have been unable to fill with a permanent resident or Canadian citizen.

LABOUR MARKET PRIORITIES FOR PHYSICIANS

"This stream has similar requirements to the Physician Stream, but candidates must be drawn from the Federal Express Entry system by the Province of Nova Scotia. Applicants must be eligible for one of the Express Entry programs.

Only candidates with an approved offer from the Nova Scotia Health Authority or the IWK Health Centre who receive a Letter of Interest from the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration may apply

ELIGIBILITY

The Physician Stream is only open to general practitioners and family physicians (NOC 3112) and specialist physicians (NOC 3111) with signed approved opportunities with the Nova Scotia Health Authority or the IWK Health Centre.

- The approved opportunity must be on official NSHA or IWK letterhead and must:
- Be signed and dated by a person authorized to hire physicians at the NSHA or IWK
- Be signed and dated by the applicant who is accepting the opportunity
- Indicate eligibility for licensure with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of NS
- Indicate that the applicant is eligible to apply for privileges and credentials with NSHA and the IWK

HOW TO APPLY

Gather all supporting documentation required for your application.

Complete the online application form.

INTERNATIONAL GRADUATE ENTREPRENEUR

The International Graduate Entrepreneur Stream is for recent graduates of a Nova Scotia university or the Nova Scotia Community College. They must have already started or bought a Nova Scotia business and operated it for at least a year. If they intend to settle in Nova Scotia, the graduate may be nominated for permanent resident status. Interested individuals are encouraged to read the guide on the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration's website and submit an Expression of Interest (EOI).

ELIGIBILITY – CANDIDATES MUST:

- Be at least 21 years old
- Want to live permanently in Nova Scotia while owning and actively managing a Nova Scotia business
- Have at least one year's continuous experience actively managing and owning your current Nova Scotia business (33.3% ownership minimum)
- Have completed a degree or diploma after at least 2 academic years of full-time, in-person study at a university in Nova Scotia or the Nova Scotia Community College
- Have a valid post-graduation work permit
- Have a score of at least 7 on the Canadian Language Benchmark in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English or French
- Complete an online Expression of Interest
- Receive an Invitation to apply from the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration
- Have a valid post-grad work permit at the time of application
- Demonstrate intention to settle



Federal Economic Class

EXPRESS ENTRY

The application process for skilled immigrants who want to settle in Canada permanently and take part in our economy.

Express Entry is used to manage applications for permanent residence under these federal economic immigration programs:

- 1. Federal Skilled Worker
- 2. Federal Skilled Trades Program
- 3. Canadian Experience Class



THERE ARE FOUR STEPS TO APPLY TO THE EXPRESS ENTRY SYSTEM:

STEP 1: FIND OUT IF YOU'RE ELIGIBLE

There are two ways to find out if you're eligible for a program that is part of Express Entry:

- answer a few questions to see if you meet the minimum requirements
- read the detailed requirements for each program

STEP 2: GET YOUR DOCUMENTS READY

You need documents, such as language test results, to show that you're eligible for Express Entry. Some documents take a long time to get, so you should get them ready now.

- Get the documents you need

STEP 3: SUBMIT YOUR PROFILE

Your Express Entry profile is where you give us information about yourself.

If you're eligible, Immigration, Citizenship, and Refugees Canada will accept you into their pool of candidates.

You'll be ranked in the Express Entry pool using a points-based system. Your score is based on the information in your profile.

- Check your score
- Submit your profile

STEP 4: RECEIVE AN INVITATION AND APPLY FOR PERMANENT RESIDENCE

Immigration, Citizenship, and Refugees Canada send invitations to apply to the candidates with the highest scores in the pool. If Immigration, Citizenship, and Refugees Canada invite you to apply, you'll have 60 days to submit your application for permanent residence.

Immigration, Citizenship, and Refugees Canada process most complete applications that have all the supporting documents in 6 months or less.

Canada's Start-up Visa Program targets immigrant entrepreneurs with the skills and potential to build businesses in Canada that:

- are innovative
- can create jobs for Canadians
- can compete on a global scale

Do you have an innovative business idea? If you can get support for your idea from one of the designated organizations, you may be able to immigrate to Canada.

WHO CAN APPLY

- To be eligible for the Start-up Visa Program, you must:
- have a qualifying business
- get a letter of support from a designated organization
- meet the language requirements
- bring enough money to settle

PRE-ARRIVAL

If you have been selected to immigrate to Canada, you and your family can find services to help before you immigrate. There are free in-person and online services that Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada funds to help you better prepare and adjust to life in Canada. These services can help you with:

- Living and working in Canada
- Getting your education, work experience and professional licenses/certificates recognized in Canada
- Connecting with employers and with free support services when you arrive in Canada

POST-ARRIVAL

Once you arrive in Canada, friendly and experienced settlement professionals can help you:

- Look for a job
- Receive a language assessment
- Register for language classes
- Find a place to live
- Fill out forms and applications
- Register your children for school
- Learn about community services
