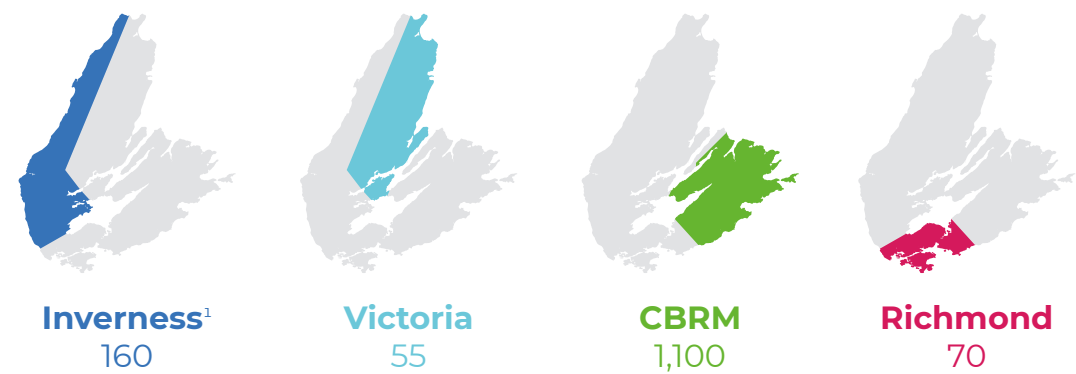

Since 2018, how many immigrants have settled in each census division on the island?



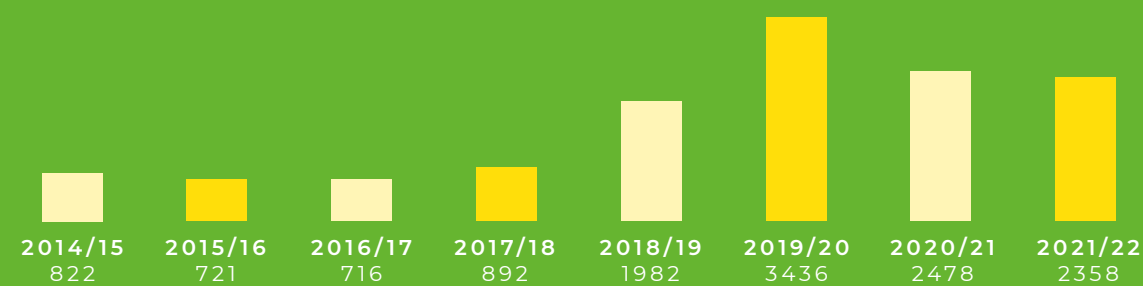

How many international students have enrolled at Cape Breton University each year?³



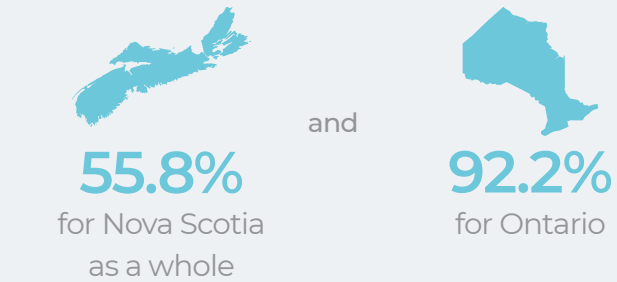

Immigrants account for 33% of all business owners with paid staff in Canada, creating important local jobs in all sectors of the economy such as construction, professional services, health care and retail trade.

Immigrants account for 1 out of every 4 health-care sector workers in Canada.

Nearly 40% of immigrants aged 15 and older are volunteers. On average, these people volunteer **162 hours each year.**

During 2020-2021, **14 newcomers** grew their networks through the Cape Breton Connector Program.

Since the Cape Breton Welcome Network formed in 2020, volunteers across the nine Welcome Groups have welcomed **225 newcomers** to their new communities.
